IVS STARTING STORIES -A HISTORY OF IVP

"None of us knew how to run an organisation but we were keen"

IVP began in Sydney in 1988 as Service Civil International, Australia. The International Coordinator of Service Civil International (SCI) wrote a letter to six people in Australia who had workcamp experience, suggesting that they start a branch in Australia. I received one of these letters having attended a 1987 workcamp in Italy.

The SCI philosophy inspired me greatly, so I organised our first meeting at a Café in Sydney. Apart from myself, two people attended: Chris Dunstan who went to workcamps in Russia and Eastern Europe in 1987, and Vern Cork who had been to workcamps in the late 70's followed by long-term volunteering with SCI Bangladesh and had then acted as the Australian point of contact for SCI. At this historic meeting, the three of us agreed to create SCI Australia.



We decided that Service Civil International, Australia would be non-hierarchical, use consensus decision-making, and follow the principles of non-violence. We committed to learning cooperation and peace-building within the organisation as well as externally in the work we carried out and we committed to creating a space for Aboriginal people in our organisation and in our lives.

STOP CLIMATE CHANGE CAMPAIGN -TREE PLANTATION

Volunteers Initiative Nepal (VIN) conducted a week long tree plantation program from 7th July, where 2500 plants were distributed and planted under Stop Climate Change Campaign. It was done through local women's group in Bhadaure, Thulachhap, and Taluwa of Okhaldhunga district which supports VIN's Environment Conservation Project. The plant distributed were 1,000 Chiuri, 300 Bay leaf (Tej Patta), 200 Mulberry (Kimbu), and 1000 Badahar.



Then, 3 special projects were presented by the following speakers and active Q&A/ discussions followed with the participants:

- Mr. Sophat Sorn (Founding President of CVA) for mangrove reforestation
- Ms. KURACHI Hana (2019 project leader, Member of NICE) for bamboo charcoals
- Ms. Dian Nursiwi (Director of GREAT) and Mr. Ogi Safrian (Area Manager of GREAT) for mangrove plantation







All of them have been co-organized since 2016 as a part of SCC (Global Voluntary Service to Stop Climate Change) together with NVDA and NICE, that has reduced over 500 tons of CO2 emissions.

Lastly, World Tanabata Action (WTA) was conducted by the facilitator, KAIZAWA Shinichiro (President of NVDA/ Founder of WTA), that is the biggest common action in IVS history with over 21,000 people in 27 countries joined and 820,000 trees planted for the climate justice.Participants wrote their actions to stop climate change on the jamboard. The event ended with a happy mood in the romantic Tanabata night!

IVS IMPACT STORIES





In the project of Wuchi, we focused on the old street renovation. In order to collect ideas from villagers on the plan of the renovated space, we had a consensus meeting with villagers. Volunteers made a few architectural models to present and get the feedback from locals. Our local host organization will conduct the project based on the results of the consensus meeting.

Although it is only a 4 days program, but it is still a fruitful program. Volunteers learned how to make architectural models which is a totally new experience to them. More importantly, they learned that it takes a lot efforts to meet the consensus of all stakeholders. This kind of community dialogue is the basis of civil democracy.





Villagers can express their ideas more clearly with the models and exchange different ideas. They are happy that those young students can come to their community and bring joy to them.

To our local host organization, they found that it is a very good way to train their staff. One of their staff conquered her fear of public speaking. The others feel more proud of their organization by the feedback of the participants.
