

JOINING HANDS FOR A GREENER TOMORROW — MY SCC JAPAN EXPERIENCE

In early July 2025, I had the opportunity to participate in "Stop Climate Change" (SCC) program in Japan, hosted by NICE (Neverending International workCamps Exchange) near Yokohama. To dramatically increase the impact of carbon reduction, the program united enthusiastic participants from India, Cambodia, Indonesia, and Japan, with a shared goal: taking meaningful action against climate change.

By pairing mid-term and short-term workcamps with carbon-offset fundraising, SCC turns practical actions—like mangrove planting and bamboo-charcoal production—into measurable climate impact while strengthening a global network of local hosts, as evidenced by two SCC Summits held in Cambodia and Japan.







The SCC meeting was attended by representatives from four organizations:

- HAGIWARA Nana from NICE, Japan
- Sophat Prasob Rachana and Choeung Soklang from CYA, Cambodia
- · Ajeng Prasasti from GREAT, Indonesia
- Arjun Rajput from RUCHI, India

Throughout the week, we engaged in a series of impactful sessions. The first day was about introductions and sharing how each of our organizations is tackling the climate crisis locally. It was deeply motivating to learn how SCC's vision is alive in diverse communities across Asia.

In the following sessions, we planned cross-border climate actions and exchanged ideas with future Japanese camp leaders. We openly discussed challenges faced by our projects and strategies to overcome them. Finally, we collaborated to create a shared Action Plan that all four SCC workcamps will implement going forward.

One session that truly resonated with me was on charcoal bamboo burning — a traditional technique that helps absorb CO₂ and improve soil quality. It was a powerful reminder that local knowledge can offer global solutions.

We also participated in hands-on environmental work with local Japanese volunteers — clearing invasive plants and planting rice. Working together in the fields brought our mission to life in the most tangible way.





Beyond the sessions, it was the spirit of collaboration, shared meals, and honest conversations that made this experience unforgettable. The warmth and dedication of the NICE team and fellow participants reminded me that real change happens through unity and grassroots action.

This experience has left me inspired and hopeful. It proved that when people from different cultures and countries come together with purpose, we can spark powerful change — starting small, but growing steadily.

Let's continue working, learning, and leading — for a greener, fairer, and better tomorrow.

WORLD PEACE ACTION DAY - 15TH AUGUST



August 15th marks the anniversary of the end of World War II, a moment for people across the globe to remember the past and commit themselves to a peaceful future.

To honor this day, NVDA, together with NICE, CCIVS, GIVE, IPYL and many international workcamps, organized World Peace Action 2025: "From WW2 Dav to Palestine/Myanmar." The online event gathered 67 participants from 31 countries, uniting volunteers. peace activists. survivors to share their voices for peace.

The meeting began with a reminder of the purpose of World Peace Action Day to learn from past wars and address today's conflicts together. Though eight decades have passed since World War II, the suffering caused by wars and violence continues, making the call for peace more urgent than ever.

Many international workcamps appreciated the campaign. They said it provides a valuable opportunity to discuss peace, represent community voices, and cooperate with others. They also noted that even small acts of support can help create a more peaceful world.



Bun, a Hiroshima survivor, shared the lasting impact of the bombing. After years of silence, she tells her story to warn the world about the human cost of war and the danger of nuclear weapons.

Speakers from Palestine, Myanmar, Cambodia and Thailand reflected on ongoing conflicts. Adli from Palestine shared the long-lasting struggles of occupation and displacement. Thazin from Myanmar speaker stressed community engagement and grassroots efforts as key to building peace. Alex from Thailand highlighted that, despite a ceasefire, tensions persist and social media has fueled fear, emphasizing the importance of dialogue, understanding, and volunteer initiatives to restore trust and harmony.

In small groups, participants reflected on war, nuclear dangers, and the role of voluntary service. They agreed that educating the next generation is vital to prevent past tragedies from repeating.

World Peace Action Day 2025 reminded us that peace needs awareness, dialogue, and solidarity. From Hiroshima to Palestine and Myanmar, testimonies showed the cost of war and the power of community action. Together, we can take small but meaningful steps toward a more peaceful world.



DALAA, THAILAND

>>> KONG POR NEUA WORKCAMP: PEACE, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY IN NORTHERN THAILAND



From December 14-23, an international workcamp will take place in Kong Por Neua, a Karen village in Chiang Mai province. It is organized by the DaLaa Association, local monk Too Neuk, and the Watcharaparamita Foundation.

Volunteers will stay at the monastery, support the Chedi Watering Ceremony (December 15–16), and spend a day with about 100 primary school students. They will also join the Universal Moral & Ethics Camp (December 19–21), where local people learn about Dharma and family ethics, while volunteers create activities for children and youth.

The camp concludes with a visit to the local forest to raise awareness about nature conservation. Accommodation is in simple shared rooms at the monastery, and all meals are vegan. Participants are encouraged to bring songs, games, or cultural ideas to share.

Limited to 15 volunteers, this 10-day program offers a unique chance to experience peacebuilding and cultural exchange in a remote community.

YUMEFUKURO WORKCAMP: TRADITIONAL CRAFTS AND ECO-CONSERVATION IN KUMAMOTO

From November 17–30, a volunteer program will take place in Fukuro, Minamata city, Kumamoto prefecture. Surrounded by mountains and the sea, this naturally rich area offers participants a chance to engage in climate change prevention and circular environmental conservation.

Volunteers will join workshops in traditional papermaking and weaving, while also assisting in community events. The program includes networking sessions, excursions, and roundtable discussions, encouraging both cultural exchange and environmental awareness Accommodation is simple and community-based, with meals shared together. With its mix of eco-activities, cultural immersion, and local exchange.



Yumefukuro Workcamp is an ideal opportunity for those seeking meaningful engagement in rural Japan.
